Chapter 6 Section 1 Primary Source, *The Jungle* by Upton Sinclair

Background – Upton Sinclair had written several novels before *The Jungle*, but this novel was his first popular success. A weekly newspaper had asked Sinclair to investigate working conditions in the stockyards, and the resulting exposé of unsanitary conditions and impurities in meat brought him instant fame. After reading *The Jungle*, President Theodore Roosevelt was determined ot see the 1906 Meat Inspection Act signed into law, one of the first pieces of legislation aimed at protecting consumers. Sinclair later became involved in politics, and even ran for governor of California.
